The Holy Ghost Fool's Lady St. George The current series of concerts by St. George's Canzona has shown the musical work of the Minstrels and Waits over a wide area of Europe and covering several centuries, as entertainers in Courts and Manor Houses, providing music for dancing, mime and other related activities. For our final programme of this season we move out into the open air, particularly into the streets and market places of the 14th, 15th and 16th centuries. We hope to show something of the role of the travelling musicians in the pageants, processions and outdoor entertainments of the time.

During the programme we shall hear popular music used as a setting for religious words, lively tunes played to refresh weary travellers, a flagellant's processional chant from the time of The Black Death in Spain, songs from the Italian Street Carnivals favoured by the Medici, and drinking songs from Germany and England. There will also be performances (including appropriate music) of The Norwich Play of Paradyse and the Play of The Templar's Knight, a Mummer's play from a tradition which was alive in early times and still continues today.
