This programme is part of a long series of recital-type entertainments which the Moot House Players have been giving for a number of years. The first was entitled MERELY PLAYERS and was given in celebration of Shakespeare's Quatercentenary in 1964 but the most famous was undoubtedly THE ESSEX HUNDREDS; this was a recital prepared for the Essex Record Office to be presented at Ingatestone Hall on June 16, 1969 and, very shortly after this the Players brought the production to Hatfield Heath for the 1969 Festival. We are very happy to return to our favourite touring date where we always feel that we are among friends.

The present programme is the latest in a series devoted to the culture of various historical periods, including literature, theatre, music, dance and, perhaps mostifunderantly of all, FOOD. Most of the literary material for this programme has been drawn from THREE MEN IN A BOAT (1889) and THREE MEN ON A BUMMEL (1900); although neither of these works is Edwardian in date, Jerome himself (1859 - 1927) spans the period and the immortal stories of "J", George and Harris are redolent of the turn of the century.

The music has been chosen to complement the textual content and we are most grateful to Tom Johnson and Moya Truman for joining the team at relatively short notice.

The English passion for al fresco meals was never greater than in the Edwardian era; letter writing manuals of the day are full of examples of how to pen appropriate invitations to such feasts - one such includes the charming phrase "..it will be quite a simple affair; not an elaborate entertainment by any means." This sumes up our present offering but as are sume that Jean Foster's oic-nic box will be more than elaborate and for the occasion!
