"A Phoenix too Frequent" was the first play of Christopher Fry's to be seen in London. The date, April 1946, was an important one as since then Fry has emerged as one of the most significant dramatists of the day. He was the first writer to produce successful comedies in verse since the days of the first Elizabeth and the Phoenix remains one of his best and most compact works. The plot is not original, being based on a story from Classical times, but Fry, has given it poetry, wit and character and the result is a classic of the modern theatre.
