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

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A Midsummer Night's Dream

THE PLAY

A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM was probably first performed in 1592, revised in 1594 and put into its final shape in 1598. It was first published in quarto form in 1600, which was followed by a further quarto edition in 1619 and finally it appeared in Shakespeare's "collected works"—the famous Folio of 1623. The three texts differ only very slightly and hence there is no difficulty in preparing a script for acting. The present version follows the Folio very closely and is virtually uncut. THE DREAM is one of Shakespeare's most finely constructed plays, the three strands of the plot—the lovers, the mechanicals and the fairies—are interwoven with great skill and are completely interdependent, while the comedy elements are beautifully balanced by the poetry.

THE PRODUCTION

As with the Moot House Players' production of TWELFTH NIGHT in 1957, the play is being presented on a stage which resembles in its main features that in common use in the public playhouses of Elizabeth the First's day, i.e. a large platform jutting out into the audience, with a formal architectural background providing three main entrances to the acting area. This year, however, it has been possible to that it spreads into the hall itself, including a form of painted ceiling which was a feature of many Jacobean houses and also, almost certainly, formed the basis for the decorative scheme of the 'heavens' of the public playhouse. Bearing in mind that THE DREAM is thought to have been given private performances at certain lavish wedding celebrations, certain features of Jacobean court masque staging have been incorporated into the production, so that the net effect is probably akin to a production in the indoor theatre at Blackfriars towards the end of James the First's reign.
