## NOTES

#### THE TEXT.

"The Winter's Tale" is one of Shakespeare's last plays and its date of composition can be reasonably safely assigned to the years 1610-11. There is no extant text other than that of the First Folio of 1623 and it is perhaps the most carefully printed play in this famous collection. The play contains some of Shakespeare's finest verse, although at the same time it is by far the most complicated in structure.

#### THE PRODUCTION.

"The Winter's Tale" is best known for the "Sheep shearing" and the Autolycus comedy scenes, but these represent only a third of the total action; the present production attempts to put these scenes into perspective with the main plot of Leontes' jealousy by the use of a full text and a swift flow of action. Although the play uses a classical religious background (Delphic oracles, etc.), Jacobean costuming has been used as being more in keeping with the atmosphere of the period of its writing.

This production, with its strange mixture of comedy and tragedy, closes the Moot House Players current season of World Comedy, although their touring show, THE PLAYBOY OF THE WESTERN WORLD, has still some four 'dates' to play.

### **FUTURE PLANS**

In August the Players have been invited to take a special production of THE MERCHANT OF VENICE to the Rogaland Theatre, Stravanger, Norway. Arrangements for this trip are well in hand and the production will be seen in Harlow during October and will thereafter become the "tour" for the 1961/62 season. The Players hope to follow this opening production with four major items during the period October to June—ideas which have already been discussed include a "world premiere" of a new play, BLOOD WEDDING (Lorca), PEER GYNT (Ibsen), MACBETH (Shakespeare), FIVE FINGER EXERCISE (Shaffer), but no decisions will be taken until after the A.G.M. of the group which takes place later this month.
