THE PLAY

PRESENT LAUGHTER was written in 1942 and has had two subsequent productions in the West End in 1947 and during the past year. The recent production, in fact, closes one week before our first night. Noël Coward has himself played the part of Garry Essendine. It is tempting—but surely rather fanciful—to imagine that Coward has depicted typical theatrical personalities. One wonders how many times he must have suffered aspiring playwrights to have created a character like Roland Maule, and whether he himself carried out the advice he puts in the mouth of Garry Essendine before he wrote his first success THE YOUNG IDEA at the age of 22. But let us not do too much serious thinking. Here is a play full of theatrical people behaving as we fondly imagine they do and the cast hope that they will present laughter throughout the three acts.

THE PRODUCTION

For this production Moot House Players are combining with The Vagrants Company of Walthamstow. It will not be the first time that members of The Vagrants have acted with Moot House, but it is the first time that the two companies have toured together with The Vagrants playing the majority of the parts. Our audiences may well remember previous Vagrants productions of PRIVATE LIVES by Noël Coward, THE LIVING ROOM by Grahame Greene and FIVE FINGER EXERCISE by Peter Shaffer. Most of the actors appearing in those productions appear in this play and we trust that our various audiences will welcome old and new players alike.
