### A WORD FROM THE AUTHOR

"'Twas my good fortune to be ordered some time ago into the place which is made the scene of this comedy. I was a perfect stranger to everything in Salop but.... Some little turns of humour I met with almost in the shade of (the Wrekin) gave rise to this comedy, and people were apprehensive that, by the example of some others, I would make the town merry at the expense of the country gentlemen. But they forgot I was to write a comedy, not a libel; and that whilst I held to nature, no person of any character could suffer by being exposed. I have drawn the justice and the clown in their puris naturalibus: the one an apprehensive, sturdy, brave blockhead; and the other a worthy, honest, generous gentleman, hearty in his country's cause...."

### THE PLAY AND THE PRODUCTION

THE RECRUITING OFFICER was presented 447 times between 1706 and 1776 without missing a single season. It continued in the repertory of provincial companies throughout the nineteenth century and has been revived several times in our century, perhaps the most notable being in the first season of the National Theatre, December 1963.

There is a modern critical tendency to read into the play a conscious satire on war and the military, but Farquhar himself says that his intention was a comedy, not a libel, drawn from observation. If there is satire, it derives from Farquhar's cynical reporting of events he experienced.
