THE PLAY AND THE PRODUCTION

The play was based by Mankowitz on a successful short novel of his and was first produced in 1959 by Joan Littlewood at the Theatre Royal, Stratford, and later transferred to the West End.

The first and most important thing about MAKE ME AN OFFER is that it should be fun. This is not a play of bitter satire; it is a play which gently takes the 'rise' out of the world of the small (and not so small) dealer, written by a man who knows this world like the back of his hand and who had become an authority on Wedgwood long before he became a playwright. I have tried all along to treat it as a play with music rather than a "musical"—hence the cast is composed primarily of actors rather than singers (with one or two notable exceptions!), nevertheless, I hope our audiences will feel that they have succeeded in 'putting over' the songs satisfactorily, and will feel as enthusiastic about MAKE ME AN OFFER as they did about EXPRESSO BONGO in the past.

The Players hope that this show may be a forerunner to LOCK UP YOUR DAUGHTERS, which may become available for amateur presentation in time for next season.
