The play is divided into 11 episodes, the first seven of which deal with the history of scientific research into the nature of matter: the last four examine the more recent developments in atomic research and their social background:

II: THE PRECURSORS III : THE LONG WINTER

IV: THE ALCHEMISTS

V: VOICES IN THE WILDERNESS

VI : THE HUNGRY YEARS

VII : A STAGE IN THE JOURNEY

VIII : THE AUDITIONS

IX: THE ATOM X : OURSELVES XI: CROSSROADS

There will be an interval, during which refreshments will be available, after Episode VII.

THE PLAY AND THE AUTHOR

URANIUM 235 was first presented by Joan Littlewood's Theatre Workshop Company during one of their earliest tours in 1945: after several years of development "in repertory" it was brought in to the Embassy Theatre, Swiss Cottage, under the sponsorship of Sam Wanamaker and Michael Redgrave. It afterwards transferred for a short run in the West End at the Comedy Theatre; this was in 1952 and since that date London has seen it no more. Theatre Workshop's famous seasons at the Theatre Royal, Stratford East, followed a year or so later and their next transfers to the West End made theatre history. Although directly instigated by two of Workshop's technical crew, Bill Davidson and Verity Smith, who happened to be scientists, the writing of URANIUM 235 was related to the policy of new plays with themes relevant to today; although we appear to have "learnt how to live with the Bomb," the play still seems to fulfill this policy even 20 years or so after its first performance and we have made no attempt so 'update' the dialogue.

EWAN MACCOLL, now well known for his ballad/documentaries for the BBC and his folk singing with Peggy Seeger, was associated with Theatre Workshop for several years, and we are particularly indebted to him for permission to present URANIUM 235.
