PRODUCERS NOTE

Apart from SIX CHARACTERS IN SEARCH OF AN AUTHOR and HENRY IV. Pirandello's plays have been unjustly neglected by the English theatre. THE RULES OF THE GAME is a play which surely deserves to be better known; in it Pirandello, as in so many of his plays, pursues his intellectual attempts to distinguish between illusion and reality, rational and instinctive behaviour, with surprising emotional and dramatic effect. Leone Gala, who has left his wife because of her affair with his friend Guido Venanzi, tries to make her see the logic of their position, and, when a situation arises in which Silia attempts to force her husband to fight a duel on her behalf, he turns the tables on his wife and her lover by the power of his logical rectitude

We hope our audiences will be interested to see the first attempts of the cast to struggle with Pirandello's complicated second act

Producers Note

"WHO ARE YOU?"!!

The Author and his Play

Luigi Pirandello was born in 1867 in Sicily; after a university career in Italy and Germany, he began to write seriously in 1891..novels, poems and, above all, plays - some forty in all. His first real success in the theatre was with SIX CHARACTERS in 1921, and HENRY IV the following year set the seal on his fame. He died in 1936 having received the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1934. The theme of SIX CHARACTERS is one which had a peculiar fascination for Pirandello, who returned to it in play after play. In effect he splits the atom which is man - "each one of us assumes himself to be one, but that is false; each of us is so many as many as are all the potentialities of being that are in us...we ourselves only know one part of ourselves, and in all likelihood the least significant".

In SIX CHARACTERS Pirandello not only uses this as his basic theme but overlays it with considerations of the nature of artistic creation in the Theatre, which complicate the issue even further!
