THE PLAY

A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S DREAM was probably first performed in 1592, revised in 1594 and put into its final shape in 1958. It was first published in quarto form in 1600, which was followed by a further quarto edition in 1619 and finally it appeared in Shakespeare's "collected works"-the famous Folio of 1623. The three texts differ only very slightly and hence there is no difficulty in preparing a script for acting. The present version follows the folio very closely and is virtually uncut. THE DREAM is one of Shakespeare's most finely constructed plays, the three strands of plot- the lovers, the mechanicals and the fairies - are interwoven with great skill and are completely interdependent, while the comedy elements are beautifully balanced by the poetry.

The play is probably the best known of any of Shakespeare's comedies as it has been a school text since time immemorial but it has recently been rescued from the clutches of the examination boards by a revolutionary production of Peter Brook's for the Royal Shakespeare Company; whether or not one agrees with Brook's approach is irrelevant – he has re-established the play as one of Shakespeare's finest works.

THE PRODUCTION

The present revival attempts to establish a firm basis of humanity through the so-called "mechanicals" and so to follow through the parallels which exist in the three main strands of the plot. It is hoped that the physical intimacy of "theatre in the round" will assist this approach, aided by modern lighting in the creation of 'magic'. Enough has been said in the Souvenir Brochure about the Hundredth Production and little needs to be added here except a heartfelt word of thanks to our advertisers for making the publication possible and to draw the attention of our audiences to the availability of souvenir ball-point pens which can be purchased from the front-of-house staff.
