THE AUTHOR and HIS PLAY

John Boynton Priestley (1894 -) is still, happily, very much alive and enjoying his 80th Birthday year. Many members of our audiences will have seen him on television and it is fitting that the Players should in some small way pay tribute to one of the stalwarts of the English Theatre, whose plays have held the ctage since 1931. His first play was an adaptation of his very successful novel THE GOOD COMPANIONS - and, interestingly enough, a musical version of the same novel is running in London now - some 43 years later.

During the 30's the nature of time sheared. During the 30's the nature of time absorbed Priestley and he wrote a series of plays exploring the problem (DANGEROUS CORNER HAVE BEEN HERE BEFORE, TIME & THE CONWAYS, THE LONG MIRROR) He did not return to this area of work until 1945 when he wrote AN INSPECTOR CALLS, in which, although not the main theme, the time factor is of some importance. In the intervening years Priestley tried his hand at "straight" plays, farces, experimental pieces(JOHNSON OVER JORDON. DRAGON'S MOUTH), even political traits (THEY CAME TO A CITY) - always with some success, never perhaps rivalling the striking achievement of his novels.

Nevertheless AN INSPECTOR CALLS is a fascinating play by any standards - it explores the nature of our dependence upon each other, using solid characterisation set in Priestley's favourite milieu - the north of England. It takes the form of a who-dun-it but is much more than that. It was written for the Old Vic Company and played by a very distinguished cast headed by Ralph Richardson, Alec Guiness, Harry Andrews and Margaret Leighton. It was chosen for revival earlier this year by Bernard Miles at the Mermaid

Theatre.
