NOTES ON TRIPLE BILL

Among the dramatists of the twentieth century in this country Coward (1899 - 1973) and Rattigan (1911 - ?) were undoubtedly the most phenomenally successful of their era, which is generally taken to be the thirties and forties. Both of them at various times in their careers turned their attention to the medium of the one act play and this programme attempts to show them off to advantage. THE BROWNING VERSION (1948) was part of a double bill, of which HARLEQ UINADE formed the second section, and in many ways is one of the best plays Rattigan has yet written, particularly in depth of characterisation. The two Coward plays show "the master" in contrasting moods and are part of his entertainment TONIGHT AT 8.30, which consisted of no less than three programmes of three one act plays written for himself and Gertrude Lawrence. FUMED OAK deals with the turning of a lower middle-class worm while RED PEPPERS examines the decay of the music hall through the medium of a struggling comedy duo. The plays were originally presented in repertory in 1936.

These productions introduce two new producers to the company - both well known to our audiences as actors and now making their first appearances in a new role. We welcome them and wish them well. RED PEPPERS was previously presented by the Moot House Players as a Festival entry in a production by Jean Walls but has never been presented in Moot Hall.
