ABOUT THE PLAY

Preceded by "The Birthday Party" and "The Caretaker", Harold Pinter's THE HOMECOMING was his third fulllength play, first produced in 1965. It is possibly the piece that lies most central to the recurring theme in the author's works - territorial battles, the revelation of character through partial truths. and fantasy (especially of a sexual nature). Indeed, Ruth - the central character - acts as a perfect catalyst to the fantasy of different kinds both individual and group, past and present, that occurs throughout this play. In chemical terms. the catalyst - that which produces change - is itself unchanged, though it might produce violent reactions and changes of state amongst the compounds between which it triggers off action. Ruth is, and always will remain, the archetypal mother/lover figure, the reincarnation of the family's real mother, Jessie; she is unchanged and unchangeable and what happens when she arrives - the 'Homecoming' - is inevitable and unavoidable.

At timesunpleasant, often funny, occasionally both at the same time, THE HOMECOMING is a major work of the most influential playwright of the last 15 years, and makes exciting theatre.
