THE PLAY

SHE STOOPS TO CONQUER was dedicated to Dr Johnson and he attended the opening performance at Covent Garden in 1773. The play was an immediate success and ran for twelve nights. It could be said to have run ever since. It is the comedy of this period which of all others has survived to the present time and is one of the stock pieces of the English stage.

THE PRODUCTION

We have attempted to reproduce in our setting the theatre of the Georgian period. A fore-stage has been added and two doors below the proscenium arch. Sliding shutters in grooves make the change of scene rapid, which is especially important in the last act where there are three short scenes. We have tried to keep to the convention of using the down-stage doors for entrances and exits except in the garden scene. This reverses the usual stage technique of entering up-stage, as favoured by most actors, and forces much of the action on to the fore-stage.
