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PRODUCER'S NOTE

A FLEA IN HER EAR is probably the best known of Feydeau's plays because of its production at the National Theatre in 1966. It is part of the repertory of the Comedie Francaise because it is one of the best examples of a particularly French style of theatre as well as being highly entertaining.

There is no point in looking for significance, meaning or message; all that is required of the audience is to suspend disbelief as coincidence is complicated by innocence, lechery and mistaken identity.

Leaving work at five o'clock and reaching home at seven was a Parisian habit that helped give that capital its reputation and provided business for hotels like the Coq d'Or, which would let rooms by the hour. It is said that the "cinq a sept" is still an institution but in the year of A FLEA IN HER EAR - 1907 - it was a way of life for many society people and the timing of events in the play depends on the audience knowing that only a couple of hours are being stolen from hearth and family.

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
