KING LEAR was probably written in 1606 and was played at the Palace of Whitehall before King James I during the Christmas period of the same year. A Quarto edition of the play appeared in 1608; this text was very badly printed and the version which took its place in the first Folio of 1623 was much revised - some 300 lines of the Quarto being omitted and some new passages added. The text for the present production is based on the Folio with some cutting and with a few additions from the Quarto. It may well approximate to that used in Shakespeare's own playhouse.

The play is set and dressed in a style which approximates to the time of its writing as this seems to the present producer to be more appropriate to the dialogue than the primitive period so often adopted. The play has been approached as simply as possible from the point of view of the family relationships of the two principal groups of characters. The text has been allowed to speak for itself uncluttered by production 'stunts.'

This will be Jack Mitchley's twentieth Shakespearean production for the Players and marks his 25th year as Artistic Director of the Company. During this period he has directed 53 plays at Moot Hall and played over 100 parts of all sizes. He is available to visit schools to discuss the King Lear production where this should seem to be of any help to examination candidates.
