NOTES

### THE PLAY

UNCLE VANYA is the Players' ninth production of Chekov's major works and the second of this particular play. Moot Hall audiences saw it first in 1965 with a cast which included three members of the present one. It was the second of Chekov's plays to be given by the Moscow Arts Theatre Company but was not written specifically for them. It was offered to the establishment-ridden Maly Theatre which turned it down as 'dramatically unsound and socially irrelevant.' It was eventually given its first production in 1899 by the Moscow Arts Theatre some 7 years after an earlier version called THE WOOD DEMON, in which the accent is rather more on the 'forester doctor,' Astrov, and the cast list is much longer. UNCLE VANYA has had several major productions in London since the Second World War—the second National Theatre version is due to open very shortly.

### THE PRODUCTION

The Players' first production of the play was given fully 'in the round' during the period when this form of staging was relatively revolutionary; on this occasion the scene design has been offered more scope and we are glad to welcome to the group of actors who have appeared in many Chekov productions, Paulene Carter and Marian Bush. As usual Chekov offers, in his own phrase, a 'ton of love' — real people struggling for happiness so that we laugh with them rather than at them in the middle of their family life.
