SYNOPSIS OF SCENES

Act I - The Family Skeleton!
At Mr. Posket's, Bloomsbury: Evening

Act II - It Leaves its Cupboard!!

Room in the Hotel des Princes, Meek Street; Later that evening

Act III - It Crumbles!!!

Scene 1: The Magistrate's Room, Mulberry Street: The next morning

Scene 2: At Mr. Posket's again: Later that morning

There will be major intervals between the Acts during which refreshments will be available

NOTES

Pinero retired from the legal profession at the age of nineteen to join Sir Henry Irving's company. In 1881 he wrote his first play and four years later his first major success, The MAGISTRATE, which opened on 21st March. A week earlier, on the 14th March, saw the opening of The MIKADO. As a gesture to the brilliance of two great entertainers, we propose to accompany Pinero's play with some of Sullivan's music and have chosen excerpts from 'Pineapple Poll' to play us into each scene. In Act II a dish of Devilled Oysters features largely; as this is a delicacy which rarely comes into most of the Players' lives, we felt it might be of interest to include a recipe:-

'Huitres grillees a la Diable' - Poach the oysters, drain and remove beards. Skewer on little metal skewers. Pour melted butter, seasoned with lemon, salt and pepper over the oysters; dip them in fine breadcrumbs, seasoned with a little cayenne pepper. Grill under a low flame. Serve on a long dish, surrounded with a border of fluted half slices of lemon. Garnish with parsley. Serve Diable sauce separately.
