JOHN GALSWORTHY (1867-1933), best known for the TV adaptation of his FORSYTE SAGA novels, was also a distinguished dramatist who had the unique distinction, with his play JUSTICE, of impressing Winston Churchill so greatly that he brought in new legislation concerning the solitary confinement of prisoners during his term as Home Secretary in 1910.

STRIFE is essentially a play about the destructive effects of fanaticism but its setting during a strike at a tin plate works has made it very topical in the 1980's with the current crisis in the tin industry and inevitable parallels with the Scargill/MacGregor confrontation last year. The last major professional revival was at the National Theatre in 1978.
