Ian Beckett presents his first production for the Players and brings back Paulene Carter to head a strong cast.


OLD MR.TIWAZ by Donald Burton Directed by Jack Mitchley

TREASURE ISLAND has been among the "top ten" children's stories ever since it first appeared in 1881 as a serial in a magazine called "Young Follies". It has never before been my pleasure as a director to write a programme note in which I can whole-heartedly thank every single member of the cast and so many other Players for the immense amount of work they have put in 'over and above the line of duty' ... building and painting, rigging the "Hispaniola", bringing specialist knowledge to the choosing of the proper sea-sharty to sing for the job in hand and last, but not least, adapting a long and complicated novel for performance - Karen Neal wisely selected the high spots of the story as they appeared to her during her first reading of the novel some 5 months ago.

It is undoubtedly our common enjoyment of a first class adventure among pirates on the High Seas that has engendered this great enthusiasm, so, although our toast at the end of the play is "Jim Hawkins", our true gratitude must be to Robert Louis Stevenson.
